## This Week's Activities!

## Area/Perimeter Project: Our students were architectur-

 al engineers as they went to the "job site" to determine the area and perimeter of various buildings. Students worked in their "family groups" over a couple of days to solve these problems and then had to determine the lay-out of the city on graph paper. Once that was determined, groups also needed to determine placement of various rooms in each building according to scale. We are currently working on this project and are not quite done yet. :)Watermelon Day: Our first activity was to complete a glyph based on some of our choices about how and when we eat watermelon. Of course, we graphed and found the data for each question. Their glyphs are super cute, too. Next, we had a spitting contest. We used black beans since it's almost impossible to find watermelons these days with seeds! We measured the distances with a meter stick and then converted our measurements into feet. :) Blake's and Albert's "seeds" went sixteen feet! :) We also had a tasting party with fresh watermelon, licorice, sour watermelon candy, and watermelon gum. Gum was the favorite for most of the class! Once again, we tallied and graphed the results and determined the range, mode, median, and mean. :) The class also determined parts of speech (nouns, adjectives, verbs) for watermelon related wordS. We also started a "Making Words" activity using the letters from "watermelon seed." Some students took it home to complete for extra credit. On Friday, we drank watermelon Kool-Aid in a special keepsake glass with a special Straw. Fun, fun, fun! :)

Legos: On Friday we had a Special Minute to Win It Day with Legos. As of this writing there were ten challenges to complete. Each table group worked individually and as a team to complete each challenge. Students sorted Legos by color while being blindfolded, Lego Pluck (using clothespins and putting them in a container, building towers, knocking towers down, spelling the word Legos with Legos, matching Legos, to name a few. Cooperation was the key to all the se challenges.
